

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Founder's Preface



It gives me great pleasure to unveil India's first set of independent Standards for Impact Assessment & Ratings for

non-profit organizations (NPOs), including CSR units and philanthropies. This herculean effort from a motivated expert group of 20+ industry practitioners took 6 months to shape up. I whole-heartedly want to thank Capgemini, who very kindly supported this bold initiative.

India needs an Impact Assessment Framework which is Standards-based, especially in the light of the upcoming Social Stock Exchange. Furthermore, legislated CSR and mandatory impact assessments for projects over INR 1 crore, will catalyze the Impact Measurement and Management (IMM) movement. Only such a framework, which congregates transparency, science, and farsightedness, can truly make Impact comparable beyond judging project or program efficiency and ensure optimized allocation of scarce philanthropic or CSR resources.

Aspire was privileged to assemble this extraordinary group of Impact specialists. Over the past 6 months, the group has across Aspire's 4P framework identified and documented 13 Impact Objectives and 41 Themes with about 130+ KPIs which can lead to an overall NPO or Project/Program Rating. The framework also allows Impact Assessment at Project/Program level, across four dimensions of Reach, Depth, Inclusion and Sustainability, making it a uniquely effective and an adaptable solution.

Moreover, this Aspire 4P Impact Assessment framework, alongside the standards, will soon be available on a

global, multilingual digital platform called IKOO, which will provide the much-needed impact transparency, comparisons and benchmarking to ensure that that precious resources are allocated to the most deserving projects/programs for the people or the planet.

Finally, the time has come to prioritise standards-based impact assessments to build a larger market for NPOs in India and around the world. Just like private, commercial capital cannot move without common understanding of financial performance and returns; or global traffic cannot move without road, sea, air rules and regulations; we will never unfetter the NPO sector and unleash its growth and impact potential unless the India and the world agrees to shared definitions, shared objectives and shared measurements. It is time that nonprofits, much like their corporate counterparts, rather more vehemently, uptake impact assessments and reporting and turn around the dismal fact that in the last one and a half decade only 30 North American non-profits submitted their GRI reports! I hope this framework will rightly inspire the industry to narrate its impact story.

This book is the first attempt in India and the world to bridge this strategic gap. We hope that with your usage and feedback, we will continue to evolve this framework and make it truly a gold standard.

Executive Summary

Introduction

CREATING A STANDARDS-BASED IMPACT ASSESSMENT FRAMEWORK FOR NPOs

The world needs a Standardized Impact Measurement & Management (IMM) Framework and Tool to measure outcomes of their programs easily; measure sustainability ranking of their own actions and process; compare results across NPOs (Non-Profit Organizations) and programs, serving different or same cause(s); to facilitate program efficiency with every comparison and measurement; and, to ensure scarce philanthropic or CSR capital is allocated to the most deserving causes.

Why measure the impact of NPOs?


NPOs are driven by the dedication to serve people or the planet. However, they need to sustain themselves and operate in an organized manner. With the popular beliefs of industry leaders, 'what gets measured, gets done', a standardized impact measurement tool serves multiple benefits to NPOs:

- It showcases the real impact they create for the people or the planet
- It attracts more donors and funds
- It helps improve their programs
- It helps them sustain, financially
- It enables cooperation with other like-minded NPOs, thus increasing the scale of impact


Current Available Tools for Impact Measurement

Today, there are more than 200 diverse tools and methods to measure impact scale and value including Social Return On Investment (SROI), Randomised Control Trials (RCTs), GRI, Social Reporting Standard (SRS), etc. They are mostly customized towards some limited causes or some organizational goals. 
Do you feel that measuring impact is a top priority?




Do you feel measuring each program independently is important?




Do you find measuring outcomes to be a challenge in the current non-profit ecosystem?

tools offer some impact measurement of various programs, they are diverted and do not allow organizations or programs to compare their results. Every organization wants to achieve the same goal of sustainable development but taking different paths wastes time and resources.

Beliefs of India NPO & CSR Leadership

Our Working Group brought together India’s NPO & CSR leadership over 4 meetings in 4 months to discuss and deliberate on the path forward. These 20+ leaders, from corporates and non-profit organizations candidly voted on their beliefs about India’s challenges and solutions in an organized manner and we learnt the following:

- 100% of the industry leaders believe that impact measurement is a top priority of the time
- 92% believe measuring each program independently is important
- 84% find impact measurement to be a challenging task in the current nonprofit ecosystem
- 50% find their current impact measurement tools ineffective, while 17% have no idea about it
- 58% already use a common framework to measure impact across programs

Our Working Group comprised of Social entrepreneurs, NPO and CSR leaders, CIOs. They collectively concluded that a common and standardized impact measurement tool when used across programs and causes will help avoid confusion in the outcomes gained; direct resources in the right direction; dwell healthy competition and cooperation among NPOs; and, make the impact creation process smooth and efficient

What can you expect from this document?

This publication called “Impact Assessment Standards for NPOs” offers a 5-level

structured Impact Assessment Methodology. It becomes more aligned towards a particular program or organization, as we move deeper in the levels. All our leaders concluded that the layered Aspire 4P Impact Tree, allows comparable impact, as we aggregate the impact numbers at the Top 4 levels of the tree. Level 5 of individual program-based KPIs must be viewed as the grassroot-level data, unique to each program or project. The five levels of the Aspire 4P Impact Tree will thus reflect the following:

- 1 At Level 1, the highest level of the framework, we have the most synthesized Impact Rating for a program or an NPO
- 2 At Level 2, we divide the overall Impact into four realms- Project / Program, People, Planet, and Policy & Governance for an organization-level impact assessment.
- 3 At Level 3, each realm gets divided into multiple categories. These categories, such as Reach, Depth, Inclusion & Sustainability for Project / Program, act as meaningful aggregations from multiple program/project themes. Every program or NPO can still be compared at this level
- 4 Level 4 divides every category into 41 themes that act as objectives/goals for a particular program or NPO
- 5 Finally, at Level 5, every theme contains a set of KPIs designed for a particular program or cause. These are bespoke and customized to each program/project, often setup jointly by the donor and NPO

Aspire 4P Impact Assessment framework, available on a standardized digital platform soon called IKOO, will provide the much-needed impact transparency, comparisons and benchmarking to ensure that that scarce and precious resources are allocated to the most deserving projects for the people or the planet.

Understanding Impact in NPOs

Social or environmental impact can be defined as the significant positive change that an organisation's activities have, that addresses a social or environmental issue or cause, and, on a larger scale, on the overall wellbeing of society and the planet. Nonprofit organisations (NPOs) promote and advocate for specific social or environmental causes.

NPOs unlike corporations cannot demonstrate their success in purely economic terms. Their success can only be demonstrated through the impact of their projects or programs and, the social or environmental change that they have been able to bring. It, therefore, becomes imperative for NPOs to measure the impact of their activities and show the impact in a transparent manner.

Further, for NPOs to raise funds it is critical for them to have a relevant and need-based mission, trust amongst stakeholders, strong governance and above all, transparency. Donors like to know whether their donations have made any social or environmental impact. There are many reasons why donors give however, there is just one reason why they don't, and the reason is not knowing how their donations are being utilised and whether the impact will be measured and reported to them. Every NPO is, therefore,

encouraged to measure its progress in fulfilling its mission, its success in mobilising its resources, and effectiveness of its employees and other partners along the value chain.

Measuring and communicating their impact however has been a challenge for the NPOs. There is still an uncertainty about the performance indicators that should be measured, how to bring out the right story, how to compare achievements with other similar projects / programs / organisations and how to communicate and connect with the audience in a compelling manner. Impact is not just what and how much, it is also about "why it matters to the recipient". Impact should be both transformational and long-term.

In the last decade, there has been a significant interest and pressure from both the private donors and the governments on NPOs for making their impact visible and measurable. The Institute of Chartered Accountants of India has recently published a draft framework for social audit standards. The framework provides area specific social indicators for nonprofits to report on the progress of their projects / programs, and impact. All this has accelerated the need for nonprofits to show results that can be quantified so that the donors, communities and government have a holistic view of their impact.

Search for a Standard Framework

Nonprofit organisations world over are looking for a scientific, standardised method to measure their impact. Currently, there are multiple sets of principles, frameworks, methodologies, ratings, technologies and other support services which can be confusing for donors, nonprofits and governments alike. It is expected that given the diverse scale, motivation, resources, design, and complexity of projects and programs, there may never be one, global standardised, comprehensive way to do it. We believe Governments and Regulators will set the minimum standards for reporting for social and environmental impact but independent standards and frameworks, which allow nonprofits and donors to show leadership using a higher bar, will always exist and prosper.

Currently, motivated by law and practice, and stakeholder interest, qualitative and quantitative impact data are being collected at unprecedented levels. Jurisdictions are developing social and environmental impact reporting regulations. Some of the initiatives are pan-global while others are specific to certain regions. Quite a few disclosures are voluntary, but regulators are increasingly mandating greater transparency.

The Impact Measurement and Management market or landscape can be segmented into six distinct areas

for market-sizing and even ten finer subsegments for clarity of understanding the forces at work. It includes providers of frameworks that define a standardized process, methodologies that are used to evaluate data, and approaches that value impacts. In addition, there are databases and rating agencies that add to the mix. Assessors and auditors also come in to stamp the authenticity of the social projects. Software technology and tools provide the much-needed scale, speed, and accessibility. Educational institutions are also gearing up in order to fill up the skill gap in the market. The existing solutions landscape is a fine matrix of different constituents, each with a specific role and focus. The landscape consists of (I) Standards, Principles & Frameworks; (II) Certifications & Rating; (III) Databases & Indices; (IV) Consulting & Services; (V) Software Technology & Tools; (VI) Executive Education.

Within this landscape, Standards and Frameworks play a particularly important role. Standards specify requirements as to “what” should be reported for each topic/category. Frameworks are a level up and provide guidance based on a set of principles, on “how” the information should be outlined.

There are several of them available for nonprofit organisation disclosures, as outlined below, each with its own scope and use-case.

Objectives and Motivations for Impact Assessment

Measuring impact is essential to enable nonprofits showcase the difference they are making on People and Planet alike.

Measuring Impact is more important than measuring activities and outcomes. Impact enables measuring the lives they touch, the forests they save, the people they help.

It is said that “The average life of nonprofits is assessed to be 10 years due to lack of adequate funding and inability to showcase impactful work.”

Nonprofits have varied motivations and objectives for conducting an impact assessment.

Creating goodwill

“Leap of Reason”, written by Mario Morino inspires leaders in the social and public sectors to take bold action to create more meaningful, measurable good for those they serve. Stakeholders across the value chain want to see the progress and the impact an organisation is making or has made over a period of time.

Communicating progress, achievements and real-life challenges and engaging with the stakeholders build transparency and help gain their confidence and goodwill.

Risk management

Risk assessments is essential for organisations to identify threats and opportunities involved in their operations. Impact assessment provides a holistic view of the organisation’s activities and highlights all such risks related to the performance and sustainability of the organization.

Fund raising

Impact is increasingly becoming important to social investors. Impact assessments help donors, funders, grant-makers and companies to understand and evaluate the impact of their social investments. The findings of an assessment help them in making evidence-based decisions for all their future social investments. For organisations seeking funding, impact assessment of their projects or programs, and reporting them thus, becomes crucial.

Collaboration and partnerships

There is strength in numbers. When NPOs collaborate, it gives each organisation an opportunity to expand its resources, tools, programs and even fundraising efforts. For smaller organisations, it gives them an opportunity to strengthen their voices and collectively advocate for their mission to create greater impact on the community. Impact assessment helps build transparency and comparability amongst peers.

Future readiness

As the donors, funders and governments are increasingly putting pressure on nonprofits to demonstrate the impact of their activities, impact assessment and reporting have become critical for the sector to adapt and adopt quickly. Institute of Chartered Accountants of India has recently published a draft Social Audit Standards and every nonprofit organisation operating in the country will be required to comply with the same soon.

Scope and Methodology

Aspire uses its proprietary 4P framework to assess a non-profit organisation's impact across Project & Program, Planet, People and Policy. These are further broken down into 13 categories and 41 themes with 130+ performance metrics collected and analysed. We award organisations a specific rating on impact, based on the outcome of the impact assessment.

Our Assessment Procedure:

- 1 Review materiality and context based on the organisation's mission
- 2 Collect data to feed into Aspire's proprietary 4P impact assessment framework, including primary surveys.
- 3 Sample testing to verify data and information provided
- 4 Interviews with senior leadership to understand risks and opportunities from an impact perspective
- 5 Development of a 5-level impact assessment report to be shared with the organization for internal use – outlining their current score at a KPI level and, also providing a list of recommendations to enhance their impact





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs

Fig 1: Relevance of NPO Theme- Achievement (% Target Population / Degree of Difficulty)





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs

Fig 1: Relevance of NPO Theme- Primary- Intervention (Sectoral) Benefits





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs

Fig 1: Relevance of NPO Theme-Local Community





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs







Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs

Energy intensity is an indicator of the energy consumed to produce a given level of output or perform an activity. Energy intensity serves as a measure of energy efficiency.

Energy consumption is essential for economic and social development, but the usage of fossil fuels is the major cause of global warming. The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) has found that emissions from fossil fuels were the dominant cause of global warming. In 2018, 89% of global CO2 emissions came from fossil fuels and industry. Improving energy efficiency and delinking economic development from energy consumption, particularly fossil fuels, is essential to sustainable development.

The United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) and the Kyoto Protocol called for limitations on total global greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions which are significantly led by carbon dioxide from fossil fuels.

The majority of ESG & sustainability frameworks capture metrics relating to the energy intensity indicative of its importance to a sustainable future.





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, production of ozone-depleting substances (ODS), and other significant air emissions are key causes of global warming. It is critical to reduce emissions and limit the rise in global temperatures to 1.50 C as per Paris Agreement, 2015.

GHGs have adverse impacts on the climate, air quality, human and animal health. GHGs are reported as either scope 1, 2, or 3 emissions. GHGs are governed by the UNFCCC and the Kyoto Protocol. The depletion of the ozone caused by the release of chlorofluorocarbons and halons into the atmosphere has become a worldwide concern. The 'Montreal Protocol' of 1987 regulates the phase-out of such ODS. Other significant air emissions like Nitrogen Oxide and Sulphur Oxide also adversely affect the climate, air quality, and health.

India is currently the world's 3rd largest emitter of GHGs after China and the USA. During the recently concluded COP 26, India pledged to reduce 1 billion tonnes of carbon emissions from now to 2030.





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Track Waste Generation & Storage

Tracking waste generation is essential to identify the current waste streams of the organization and determine how much waste is generated. As per a 2014 Planning Commission Report, India generates 62 million tonnes of waste each year. 



Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs

Suits, legal action, judgements on account of non-compliance with aforementioned laws can affect an organisation's goodwill. Identification of applicable laws to the organisation's industry and operations, and determining legal requirements are key to achieving regulatory compliance.

Incorporating and developing a compliance culture and promoting this culture throughout the organisation is essential. Being transparent about compliance processes helps build stakeholder trust.





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs



Transparent ESG, Sustainability & Impact Reporting

NPO Theme Number: 36 (ASP-NPO-POL-CRT-405)

ESG, Sustainability and Impact reports serve as a tool for organizations to communicate their performance on economic, social, environmental and governance aspects. Publishing the aforementioned reports in the public domain facilitates greater transparency, accountability and helps build organisational goodwill. Furthermore, it enables more informed decision making for the stakeholders.

Impact reporting in India and across the globe is mostly voluntary and is viewed as a statement of leadership. Such reports often include both anecdotal stories and a discussion on aspirational goals in addition to reporting quantitative data on topics like carbon footprint, energy & water use, labour & human rights, community impacts, diversity and inclusion, workforce engagement.





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs



Ensure Data Privacy

NPO Theme Number: 37 (ASP-NPO-POL-CRT-406)

As the world is increasingly moving online, data protection and privacy have become a top priority for both individuals and organisations. A robust data security policy aims to ensure that only approved parties have access to the data in an organisation’s custody. Organisations that fail to enforce data security risk losing confidence and trust of its stakeholders, incur losses (both monetary and reputation) and attract lawsuits.

Ensuring data is used only for purposes agreed by the user is essential to maintain user trust and organisational reputation. Organisations that implement such controls will cut down on the number of threats and vulnerabilities that result in security breaches. According to IBM Reputational IT Risk Report, 46 percent of organizations’ brand value and reputation were harmed as a result of security breach incidents.¹

Fig 1: Relevance of NPO Theme- Ensure Data Privacy





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs



Assess Board Independence

NPO Theme Number: 38 (ASP-NPO-POL-CRT-407)

As a collective body working towards the organisation’s mission while protecting the organisation’s as well as its stakeholders’ interests, there arises a need for the board to be unbiased in its decision making. A strong, compliant and independent board facilitates the same.

The board’s independence is crucial to ensuring that it fulfils its role objectively and holds itself answerable to the organisation. Because they have no material interest in the organisation and will profoundly represent the interests of the organisation, its employees, donors, beneficiaries, sponsors, members, volunteers and other stakeholders, independent directors aid in the proper functioning of the corporation.

Fig 1: Relevance of NPO Theme- Assess Board Independence





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs



Prevent Adverse Stakeholder Actions

NPO Theme Number: 39 (ASP-NPO-POL-CRT-408)

Non-profit organisations have an obligation and responsibility to preserve and serve the public good. In addition to formal authorities, they are accountable to their stakeholders too. It, therefore, is critical for the organisations to build an effective relationship with their stakeholders and manage their expectations and address their concerns efficiently.

Any adverse stakeholder action highlights the inadequacy of the organisation’s governance practices, indicating that they may not have completely considered the adverse impact on various stakeholder groups. Managing the stakeholders can be a source of distraction for the organization and steer them away from focusing on implementing a long-term strategy. Stakeholder campaigns consume a great deal of management time and can also impede the successful establishment of sustainability objectives in its operations and effective governance.

Fig 1: Relevance of NPO Theme- Prevent Adverse Stakeholder Action





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs



Minimize Business Continuity Risks

NPO Theme Number: 40 (ASP-NPO-POL-CRT-409)

For a non-profit organisation to fulfill its mission, raise funds and sustain its operations over the long term, a Business Continuity Plan is required. A Business continuity plan (BCP) / Business continuity model (BCM) provides a framework for developing effective responses and building resilience against business continuity risks. It is essential to guard the interests of various stakeholder groups and to protect the organisational goodwill. A BCP's primary goal is to safeguard people, property, and assets. It also assists the entity in recovering from unanticipated operational interruptions, property destruction, and economic impacts.

The plan entails defining all the risks that might impact the organisation's operations, making it an integral part of the organization's risk management approach. The plan also specifies how such factors will influence operations and enforces risk-mitigation safeguards and procedures. Regular testing of the business continuity plan helps to ascertain its effectiveness, improve predictability, assists in the discovery of gaps, and establishes alignment of the plan with the business model. It should be examined several times to make sure that it can be used in a diverse array of risk scenarios. This will focus on identifying any shortcomings in the plan, which can then be addressed.

Fig 1: Relevance of NPO Theme- Minimize Organisation Continuity Risks





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs





Maximize Impact

NPO Theme Number: 41 (ASP-NPO-POL-CRT-410)

Non-profit organisations are critical for bringing social change. Their role is to provide economic, political and social rights and opportunities to the vulnerable, marginalised or disadvantaged groups. An impact-oriented mission statement is indicative of the commitment of the organization to embed impact in decision making at all levels within the organization. Organisations can achieve their maximum positive impact and make informed decisions by designing projects or programs tailored to the stakeholder needs, fostering innovation, leveraging resources efficiently, and practicing sustainability in its operations.

Organisations can influence public policy through a well-designed project or program that has achieved a significant reach, thus, maximizing its impact.

Fig 1: Relevance of NPO Theme- Maximize Impact





Fig 2: Relevance of KPIs



Recommendations

This section details recommendations to stakeholders for adoption of Impact Assessment standards, frameworks or tools:

NPOs

- Focus on long-term total impact performance not just reporting and compliance. Long-term impact performance requires fundamental changes in program design, people, planet and policy paradigms. Treating this as a strategic responsibility will allow NPOs to embed Impact in their DNA for long-term success.
- Have in place a strong governance structure. The era of impact focus leaves no scope for weak governance mechanisms or fragmented organisational efforts. Change in culture, project / program design, target audiences, environmental risk management can only be achieved by a strong governance structure.
- Adopt impact assessment frameworks like Aspire 4P which gives an NPO the flexibility to conduct impact assessment at both the Project/Program Level and the organizational level.
- Adopt tools like IKOO, Aspire's digital platform so that there is total digitization of impact data collection without any repetitive efforts and you can drill down or aggregate up to look at impact at different levels. Use visual tools like Aspire's Impact tree as an executive roadmap highlighting levers for improving Impact.

Donors

- Consider an independent, all encompassing, set of standards, which can help assess the impact of your social investment(s). Aspire's 4P model provides the flexibility to assess the impact of each program separately and consolidation at the organization level.
- As donors, your social impact is a function of your donee nonprofits. Use tools like IKOO, to ensure your donee nonprofits can use it for reporting impact data to you and for themselves to avoid multiple technologies.

Regulators

- True inclusivity and green growth will require comprehensive and holistic reporting- well beyond current impact assessment metrics. You will need to capture the context and impact of the organisation through its programs (product and services) by measuring its reach, depth, inclusivity and sustainability (product and environmental), to meaningfully pursue the SDGs. Whereas Governments and securities market regulators around the world may set minimum standards, there has to be space for independent standards which further catalyse the journey for market leading corporations and nonprofits alike towards total impact performance. Aspire Impact is one such independent standard. The existence of these standards will further enable healthy competition, creativity and regular upgradation of all standards to stay in tune with the times.

- Current reporting mandates (e.g., Social Audit Standards proposed by Social Reporting Standards Board in India) should have a holistic approach to impact assessment, in true pursuit of Responsible Corporate Governance, Net Zero pursuit and SDG accomplishment. Only when Impact transparency is made mandatory, will we truly get on the path of social, environmental and economic justice for all. Aspire's 4P

methodology provides an empirical non-financial performance analysis rather than a disclosure-based analysis which is key to ensure comparability and better decision making. A third-party assurance, as provided through Aspire, on non financial performance akin to an auditor's assurance on financial performance is essential to ensure credibility of disclosed information and gain trust of diverse stakeholders.

Applications & Case Studies

Aspire's 4P framework with its Impact tree can be used to compare the performance of nonprofits across sectors, irrespective of their size or geography. The framework allows nonprofits the flexibility to measure impact at the project or program level, or at an overall organizational level. The Impact trees on the following pages consolidates the Impact performance of various nonprofits that we have assessed at the project / program level. All these nonprofits so far have been Impact leaders. With a view to understand the current state of play of impact measurement in India, this section details insights emerging from some of the impact assessments conducted by Aspire.

Approach


- The insights are based on impact assessments of clients from the Healthcare, Social Leadership and Education sectors.
- The data collected by Aspire while conducting the Impact assessment were used to draw insights.
- The data were analysed for obtaining insights on:

- Sector wise reporting readiness
- Sector wise performance
- Sector wise performance across selected KPIs


Findings

- Across sectors, highest disclosure was in the 'Reach' and 'Depth' impact objectives. Majority of the KPIs in these sections are quantitative in nature and are collected through primary surveys.
 - 'Inclusion' across sectors showed medium level disclosures since KPIs like accessibility, diversity and inclusiveness of marginalized communities are not captured completely.
 - 'Environmental sustainability' objective saw the lowest disclosure for two sectors. Reporting readiness was the lowest for all KPIs.
 - Overall, highest ratings have been on the Project / Program "Reach" and "Depth" impact objectives.
 - "Environmental sustainability" has been rated the lowest amongst all the objectives.
